Welcome to our Autumn Newsletter 2016.

So much work goes on behind the scenes, week in and week out by both our outings and holidays committee members and also members of our general committee. Indeed, we must also thank others who - having made the decision to step down from committee work - pop up and kindly continue to organise special one offs. To all who have helped in so many ways, thank you.

Our Books for Brownsea bookshop has, for the past three years, been a resounding success and members have donated over 2000 books to generate income for the Island. It has been decided to stop book collections for this year but please do remember - Kingston Lacy and Brownsea Island do continue to need books to replenish the book shop stocks. If you are visiting please do take any you may have finished with.

Sadly, some of our committee members have suffered prolonged ill health and this has meant withdrawal from active service and support. I don't propose to name people - you know who are you are- but you are greatly missed and we wish you well for the coming months.

At the time of writing my comments, the Association is looking somewhat shaky. Repeated requests for individuals to fill roles have led to a nil response. This means that we continue to need the following -

1. **Lunch coordinators.** We have had to make the decision that there will not be a Christmas lunch; there is no one to organise it.
2. **Talks coordinator.** The talks have been arranged for this coming season [see pages 13-16], however work needs to started shortly on 2017-18.

3. Members for the Outings and Holidays committee. The outings have reduced in number and- unless we receive the new organisers - these may have to reduce further.

Additionally because of illness, our publicity officer Giles will need to hand over in the near future.

Treasurers Notes – Our donations to National Trust

This is my first Report since becoming Treasurer for the NTA – Bournemouth & Poole.

It covers the 1st Half year period from 1st January 2016 to 30th June 2016.

Bank balances as at 1st January were £10,306.97

Bank balances as at 30th June 2016 are £14,659.00 (includes 1 Unrepresented cheque of £201.45)

A Pre-Payment of £375.00 was made to the Upcoming Outing Studland Tractor/Trailer.

A Cash Float of £40.00 remains (Used for Change at the talks events).

An increase of funds for the period of £4,352.03

Talks

During the period, there were 7 Talks given, with a Gross Income of £2,027.00 and a Net Income of £1,135.85. In total 515 Members and 30 guests attended.

This amount includes £361 from Raffles; Room Hire of -£450.00;
Speaker costs of -£391.45
and Refreshment costs of -£47.00 *Note Pre-Payment details at end of Report.
Giving a average 55.51% net profit over gross profit.

Spring Lunch

The spring Lunch was attended by 97 (+2) Members, with a Gross Income of £2,532.50 and a Net Income of £336.47.

This amount includes £156 from Raffles; Gratuities of -£121.98;
Venue costs of -£2,074.05
Giving a 13.29% net profit over gross profit.

Holidays

During the period, there was One Holiday – Hereford, with a Gross Income of £1,345.30 This event was attended by 42 (+2) Members, with a Gross Income of £19,140.00 and a Net Income of £1,345.30

Giving a 7.03% net profit over gross profit.

Outings

During the period, there were Two outings – Waddeson Manor & West Dorset Wanderers.

Waddeson Manor - This event was attended by 43 Members (with 1 cancelled through illness), with a Gross Income of £1,032.00 and a Net Income of £287.00 Giving a 38.52% net profit over gross profit.

West Dorset Wanderers - This event was attended by 51 Members, with a Gross Income of £1,428.00 and a Net Income of £469.00
Giving a 32.84% net profit over gross profit.

Membership

During the period, Membership Renewals/New Memberships totalled £2,415.00. This equates @ £5 per membership to 483 Members (not including Life/Honorary Members)

The costs of maintaining Membership (including, Newsletters, Postage, Stationery, and New Members Welcome coffee morning) were -£743.99

Payments made to retiring Members of the committee during the period for their Services rendered was -£30.00 A Donation of £1.00 was received (from an overpayment of Membership Fees).



Pre-Payments

Winchester is a must-visit destination for all those in search of an authentic Christmas experience. The Cathedral is at the heart of the festivities with its stunning Christmas Market and real Ice Rink. 2016 marks the 10th anniversary of these hugely popular events so promises to be a very special year indeed.

From its relatively modest beginnings, the Winchester Cathedral Christmas Market has achieved a reputation as being amongst the very best in Europe. Within the stunning surroundings of the Cathedral’s historic Inner and Outer Close you’ll find over 100 attractive wooden chalets brimming with goodies. The stallholders are individually selected by the Cathedral’s in-house team to ensure superior quality, uniqueness and that a wide range of products is available. Each year there’s a rotation of stallholders and a good percentage of invited new traders to keep the market fresh. There’s a strong emphasis on British and artisan amongst the stallholders.

Winchester at Christmas is buzzing with excitement, with visitors from all over the country, and from further afield, travelling to experience its festive atmosphere. Retailers, hoteliers, restaurants and bars, all eager to stand out from the crowd, strive to offer the best in a city that sparkles brightly for Christmas. The result is a city proud to call itself England’s Christmas Capital, with the Cathedral and its Christmas Market at the very centre of the celebrations.

Hereford Holiday Report – The City and Surroundings

Hereford is not a place many people go to for a holiday but is well worth visiting. We stayed at The Green Dragon Hotel, which, at one time, was the premier hotel of Hereford. On our way to this delightful City we stopped at Tyntesfield, a Victorian Country House for many years the home of the Gibbs family.

Our first day was spent in the city and most went to the Cathedral to see the Mappa Mundi and the Chain Library as well as the wonderful stained glass windows in The Trehearne Chapel. The Cathedral is small but has recently been beautifully refurbished. I loved the bright coloured embroidered panels at the entrance. The City of Hereford has a bustling market centre with lots of coffee shops and places to sit and watch the world go by.

On Tuesday, our second day, we went to Symonds Yat for a trip on the river Wye. Unfortunately it was raining but despite this we managed to enjoy the scenery.

In the afternoon we had a private visit to the 19th Century Eastnor Castle with its mock towers and crenelated walls. We were shown around some wonderful rooms and saw lots of armoury.

The following day we visited Berrington Hall, had lunch there and lots of time to visit the Hall and gardens. The Hall had some very interesting pictures and furniture but unfortunately the custodians took the matter of keeping the sun off too seriously and the rooms were in near darkness.

Later that day we went time in the market town of Ludlow in Shropshire with its historic castle, which is part Norman.

Thursday was the fifth day of our holiday and we had a great time at The Weston Cider Mill. After being shown around the factory and the orchards it was tasting time. The ciders were sweet and smooth, nothing like the scrumpy of my youth. A ploughman's lunch followed and before we left we were presented with a small jug to remind us of our visit.

That afternoon we travelled to one of the oldest historic houses in England, Hellens Manor, still a family home. One of the bedrooms is said to be haunted. The first known owner was Harold Godwinson in 1057. In the thirteen hundreds it was in the hands of the Helyon family whose descendants

live there today. The house is full of ancient and beautiful paintings and decorations, including the crest of the Black Prince.

Our final day was a trip into Wales, to Presteigne to see The Judge's Lodging, an outstanding museum with its restored judge's rooms, Courtroom and cells and the dark and dank servant's quarters.

In the afternoon we walked around Croft Castle and parkland set in the middle of the Welsh Marches. The Croft family lived there for a thousand years but is now looked after by the National Trust. One of the really interesting items is letters from Jonathan Croft to his mother, written during the First World War.

On the way home we called in at Stourhead, a favourite place for our members where we lunched and shopped.

Our thanks, as always, go to Valerie for organising such a great holiday, and thanks also to Daphne, Margaret, John and Paul for acting as leaders for the various days.

Thursday 26th January 2017 at 2.15p.m. (Forestdale Suite)

Brian Pettit has an international reputation as a wildlife photographer. It has taken over two years to book him (!). Today he is providing a High Definition multimedia presentation of the 'Wildlife of The New Forest". Together with its history and ancient traditions the New Forest is home to a host of Wildlife Species. This talk seeks to provide an insight into the lives and behaviour of some of that Wildlife diversity and highlights many of the well known and much loved species as well as many that are less so.

Thursday 9th February 2017 at 2.15p.m. (Forestdale Suite)

Mr John Hallett - a founder member of the Association is speaking about Arundells, the charming and peaceful house located within Salisbury's

magnificent Cathedral Close. The talk looks at the history of the house and its wonderful collection built up by the last owner, Sir Edward Heath. It includes the garden, and an overview of the wider cathedral close in which the house is set.

Thursday 23rd February 2017 at 2.15p.m. (Forestdale Suite)

Another new speaker for members to enjoy - **Mr Francis Burroughes** . With positive reviews from many who have heard his talks, Francis is speaking on 'The Man Who Re-built Wessex.' Architect, Benjamin Ferrey (1810 - 1880). In his time Ferrey built and restored over 200 churches, houses, and public buildings in the West Country and beyond. Many buildings in Dorchester are by him, and Wells Cathedral owes much of its present appearance to the work he did there, as does Christchurch Priory and Romsey Abbey. He was also responsible for laying out the original street plans of the new sea-side resort of Bournemouth.

Thursday 9th March 2017 at 7.15p.m. (Forestdale Suite)

Royston Slade will be speaking on '**Dickens, his life and Indiscretions**'. Charles Dickens's novels are well known to us all but there are aspects of Dickens's life that remain less well known. Royston will delve into these and include the story of Dickens and his mistress.

Thursday 30th March 2017 at 2.15p.m. AGM (Forestdale Suite)We welcome a guest speaker **Hannah Jones**. Hannah is the South West Regional Volunteering and Community Involvement Officer with the National Trust.

Thursday 27th April at 2.15p.m. (Forestdale Suite)

After his oversubscribed talk last season we are fortunate to have a return visit by **Ron Taylor** who will be speaking about **Southampton Water from Broadlands to Spithead**. Our journey starts at Broadlands, the magnificent country house in Romsey, situated on the River Test. Broadlands. We go down the River Test to Redbridge, the haunt of smugglers and into Eling Creek and its ancient Tidal Mill. We cross the water to one of Europe's largest container ports, then back to the Military Port at Marchwood; then the Isle of Wight ferry terminal and the Hythe Ferry and its wonderful pier railway, the historic Ocean terminal - home of great liners of a past era, Titanic and to

modern day cruise ships. We visit Hamble, and the Hampshire Police 'town' for training the police in riot control. In the Solent and opposite, we have Cowes – the home of the world famous regatta, home of the invention of the Hovercraft. Finally into Spithead, the historic site of the Spithead review.

Thursday 25th May 2017 at 2.15p.m. (Forestdale Suite)

Another coup for our Association, we welcome **Mr Paul Atterbury** . Paul is well known currently because of his involvement with the BBC' s 'The Antiques Roadshow . He will be joining us to share his experiences '**Behind the Scenes at The Antiques Roadshow**'- and inviting questions from members.
